I love camping. When I was a kid, we went with our entire family to the local state park, Lake Keomah, in south-central Iowa for a week or two during the summer.

Like my father, I love sitting around a campfire and putting the logs on to keep the fire burning. I still love the smell of a campfire and the orange and red glow of the embers in the dark of the night. I also enjoy being out in nature and exploring God's creation. I understand the thought many people have that being out in nature gives a sense of being close to God.

Camping for my mother was simply more work. She enjoyed the change of pace and being out at the campground, but it took a lot to plan, prepare, pack up and care for all us kids away from the convenience of home and do all the unpacking and cleaning up once we were home again.

Because there were so many of us, we couldn't all sleep in the bus we had for a camper. We boys didn't get to sleep in the beds but experienced the rougher life of sleeping out in a tent. Though alright for a while, we knew we didn't want to do it all the time. A good thing about camping is we know it is temporary and makes us appreciate being home all the more.

The Bible talks about God "tenting" among us. In the Gospel of John we read, "The Word became flesh and *made his dwelling* among us." Literally, "he *tented* among us." Jesus took up his residence and lived among us—God in human flesh. If we had lived

back then, we could have met God and walked and talked with Jesus as we do each other.

The idea of a tent as a place of meeting with God goes back to the Old Testament tabernacle which was known as the Tent of Meeting. It was the place where God in his glory would come down and meet with Moses and be in the midst of the people. The tabernacle was a temporary arrangement pointing forward to a more permanent place of meeting with God. Even the temple, a building made of stone, was a temporary arrangement—a picture of the permanent place of meeting with God.

When John is given a vision of heaven, he reports in Revelation 21:22, "I did not see a temple in the city, because the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb are its temple." Heaven is where we will not only meet with God, we will finally be home with God living in his presence forever.

Jesus makes that reality for us. For now, enjoy "tenting it," but know it's only temporary. Our home and eternal place of meeting and being with God awaits us!





Your leadership will provide others a small group to join. Without leaders, we cannot add additional small groups.


Your leadership will help other people grow in Christ.

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
